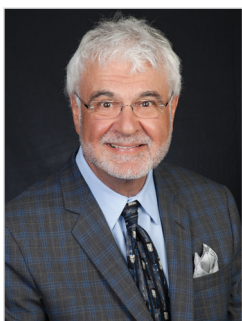
The Informed Consent process is the least practiced but most essential part of Record Keeping. If properly performed it authenticates the progression of treatment and re-enforces the dentist-patient relationship. If done poorly it may lead to a breakdown in communication and ultimately dissatisfaction with treatment leading to a College Complaint. This presentation highlights the key principles of Informed Consent namely autonomy and capacity. Getting it right is an essential practice tool!

### COURSE OBJECTIVES

1. Define and understand the Informed Consent process by applying five essential questions to the process.
2. Matching up autonomy with Informed Refusal and capacity in the case of divorce custody.
3. Provide strategies to employ these tools in the most appropriate manner, while maintaining the professional and regulatory obligations inherent in our profession
